Part A

Preterite (past tense) of verbs.

****Read the following extract** from *Bora Brav* by Polin Prys page 162 (nebes amendys)

Dy'Meurth Ynys (*Shrove Tuesday*)

Dy'Meurth Ynys o hag Oliv Penngelli a vynnas pareusi krampoth rag hy theylu. Nyns esa saw unn oy y'n yeynell. "Res yw dhymm pellgwsel orth Walter", a brederis Oliv "hag ev a yll prena oyow war an fordh dhe dre."

Walter a vynnas prena an oyow saw, y'n gwettha prys, ny allas ev distowgh. Ny werthas an kynsa gwerthji oyow. Ev eth pella hag a gavas gwerthji aral wortiwedh. Y'n gwella prys ev a allas prena oyow ha dew binta leth ynwedh.

Kyns mos tre Walter a lewyas an karr dhe'n karrji. Ena ev a worras menoyl y'n karr. Ena ev a dheuth tre hag ev a wrug ri an oyow ha'n leth dh'y wreg.

Nebes a-wosa an krampoth o parys. Oliv a worras diw grampothen war bub plat ha'n teylu a wrug dybri oll.

Notennow

1 krampoth is another collective. A pancake is krampothen, we could have krampothennow but the usual word used for pancakes (and who wants only one!) is krampoth.

2 saw: do you remember this use of saw, but. Nyns esa saw unn oy there was only one egg (not was but one egg).

3 All tools and devices ending in -ell are feminine and form the plural with +ow

4 y'n gwettha prys, unfortunately (in the worst of times)

y'n gwella prys, fortunately (in the best of times)

5 the preterite (simple past) tense of verbs.

You have already met the preterite tense of the auxiliary verbs gul, mynnes and gallos. The 3rd person singular, preterite, of most verbs is formed by adding -as to the stem. A few verbs take -is instead. Some verbs are irregular

Verbs ending -el form the preterite with -is as do many of those ending -i

Mos, like bos, does not have a particle in the preterite (or the present) tense.

Remember you can always use gul. I walked to the church. My a gerdhas dhe'n eglos or my a wrug kerdhes dhe'n eglos.

For the moment, if you want to be nosey or negative then use gul. We didn't go to the meeting. Ny wrussyn mos dhe'n kuntelles.

Dy'Lun an 19^{ves} a vis Gortheren: Kynsa dydh yn Majorca. Ni a wrug mos dhe'n treth. Nyns esa spas vyth dhe esedha war an treth. Milweyth gweh ages Logh yn kres an hav! Byttegyns, nebes tomm yw an mor omma.

Dy'Meurth an 20^{ves} a vis Gortheren: An dre ma yw leun a dus sowsnek! Kepar ha Porth Ia yn mis Est. Pub huni yw leskys rudh gans an howl – ny vynnons i dyski!

Dy'Mergher an 21^{ens} a vis Gortheren: Ni a wrug gul tro y'n pow. Pur deg yw an menydhadow omma mes, dell hevel, tus an enys yw boghosek. Y'n gwettha prys yth esa droglam gans an kyttrin mes ni a wrug dehweles dhe'n ostel wortiwedh.

Dy'Yow an 22^{ens} a vis Gortheren: Nyns yw da an boos na'n diwes gans an teylu! Yn hwir, gwell yw genev blas korev S. Austel. Dohajydh yth esa taran ha lughes ha kowasow glaw euthyk.

Dy'Gwener an 23^{ens} a vis Gortheren: Hedhyw, ni a wrug skrifa kartennow post dh'agan kowetha ha kentrevogyon yn Kernow. Ober skwithus!

Dy'Sadorn an 24^{ens} a vis Gortheren: Res yw dhyn ombareusi rag mos tre. Taran arta! Wella a wrug hwyja y'n kyttrin. Ny vern! Da vydh genev bos tre arta kyns pell. My a vynn gortos yn Kernow an vledhen a dheu.

1 nyns yw da na'n boos na'n diwes gans an teylu *the family like neither the food nor the drink neither ... nor ... is na ... na ... in Cornish . this use of na does not cause a mutation*

2 dates: 25th September is often 25 mis Gwynngala but should be an 25^{ens} a vis Gwynngala

The ordinals from 21 onward are formed from the numbers above and ‘warn ugens’ or ‘ha dew ugens’ etc

21st kynsa warn ugens 21^{ens}

32nd dewdhegves warn ugens 32^{ens}

40th dew ugensves 40^{ves}

44th peswora ha dew ugens 44^{ens}

70th degves ha tri ugens 70^{ens}

So 40, 60, 80 have ves as the abbreviation and all others have ens

Remember

1) A noun following a numeral is always singular.

2) Mil (1000) is feminine and causes 2nd state mutation in any following noun but not in additional numerals.

3) In the case of a compound number, the noun follows the first part of the compound.

e.g. unn den warn ugens. twenty one men.

tri harr tan ha dew ugens. forty three cars.

peder kanstel ha pypm kans. five hundred and four baskets.
